## New team formed to care for people with diabetes

Violetta (not her real name) learned she was pre-diabetic when she came to Spring into Health in March, an event at the Center when women can get complete exams for a minimal cost. Although her condition was not yet serious, Violetta asked for a glucometer so she could monitor her blood sugar. She used it—and not just for herself. She discovered that her husband's blood sugar was higher than hers!

Since March, Violetta and her husband have come back to the Center several times for educational sessions with Barb Landes, diabetes education nurse. In addition, the couple is monitored and tested for health problems that are often related to diabetes.

We have a growing number of patients diagnosed with diabetes who need this kind of ongoing educa-

tion and care. The volunteer doctors and nurses in our urgent care clinics do well in diagnosing diabetes. However, finding physicians to follow up with the consistent care these patients need has been difficult.

So a new Chronic Care program began in July. Michelle Shelly, M.D., and Erin Castro, medical assistant, joined our staff, completing a team that works with uninsured patients who have diabetes. In addition to Dr. Shelly, Erin and Barb, the team also includes Gil Pérez, clinic manager, and Marbella Chavez, patient advocate and community health worker.

We believe each patient can be healthy and live fully, even with diabetes. So we provide consistent, individualized care with the goal of bringing both healing and hope.

Dr. Shelly is a board certified family

medicine physician, fluent in Spanish, who has a special interest in working with patients who have diabetes. (See more about Dr. Shelly at **CHHclinics. org/blog/chronic-care-team.**)

ne major development is the Diabetes Alliance Program for uninsured patients with diabetes. When they enroll, they receive all the recommended tests and care needed to stay healthy—such as regular retinal eye exams and vaccines. The cost for this program is only \$30 each month, compared to an annual cost of more than \$3,000 if they paid cash in a traditional medical practice. 

hank you to Boling Vision Center for including the Center for Healing & Hope in the Kindness to Prevent Blindness program.

- As a result of this partnership for our uninsured patients, we referred several children when we discovered vision problems during our summer School Physicals program.
- At Work Release, we learned that a patient was unable to get a job because of poor vision. Through this program, he qualified for a free exam and free glasses and then was able to get a job.
- When another patient was referred to Boling, he was diagnosed with vision problems related to diabetes. They called back to CHH to make sure we knew about his need for diabetes monitoring in our Chronic Care Program.
