Year-in-review: Top 10 Moments of Hope & Healing



This was a landmark year at the Center for Healing & Hope for many reasons. In the midst of much growth and change, our team was able to rise to meet challenges such as increasing patient visits, adding new services, and raising funds to cover the costs of new and evolving programs. As we embark into 2020, and as our patients grapple with national issues like creeping health care costs and increasing regulations for immigrant families, we know that our work is perhaps more significant now than ever before. With the help of our volunteers, community members, and supporters like you, we know we will continue to rise to meet the unmet health needs in our community for many years to come.

- This year, we served more patients than ever before. Forty-six percent of those patients were coming for the first time.
- The success of the Diabetes Alliance Program
 (DAP) has surpassed our highest hopes. We hear
 daily the gratitude, relief, and appreciation
 of patients who are finally able to access the
 services they need to manage this expensive and
 deadly disease.
- 3. The Chronic Care program successfully enrolled in the state-funded Breast and Cervical Cancer Program (BCCP) and WiseWoman (cardiovascular screening services) programs. Collaborating with these programs allows women to receive free services, including mammograms, follow-up visits, health coaching, and access to ancillary services such as pedometers and gym memberships.
- 4. We succeeded in fully implementing our electronic health record. This integrates care and increases efficiency across urgent, preventative, and chronic care lines. This new system provides a much higher level of safety and documentation.
- In the fall of 2019, for the first time, CHH offered low-cost flu vaccines to ensure our patients are protected
- Through collaboration with other non-profit consortiums, we have obtained nearly \$3,000,000 in medications and supplies for free during the past year.

- 7. We secured the donation of a \$5,000 RetinaVue instrument, which allows us to provide **on-site screening tests for diabetic retinopathy**, the leading cause of blindness in the U.S.
- 8. Our clinic partnered with the National Immigrant Justice Center to perform several forensic medical exams for their clients. These exams document physical scars on asylum seekers that resulted from torture and abuse in their home countries. NIJC has told us that, as of their report, all clients we assisted successfully won asylum, and they pointed to the physical evidence we were able to document as a key factor.
- 9. We have worked for immigrant advocacy by facilitating the Indiana Latino Business Expo, Elkhart County Immigrant Consortium, Elkhart County HOPE Network, and partnering with the Latinx Mental Health Coalition. These programs have provided education, resources, and financial assistance to dozens of immigrant families in need.
- To celebrate our 20th anniversary, our donors contributed over \$50,000 in donations in only 90 days. These donations were doubled by a matching grant from the Community Foundation for Elkhart County.

Message from Leadership

As we reflect on the past year, we ponder many themes that describe our organizational journey. It has been a period of much growth. We've seen an increase of patient visits, added comprehensive medical and preventative services, and met our fundraising goal to raise \$50,000 in 90 days to celebrate our 20th anniversary. Like in many periods of growth, this has also been a time of great change. We succeeded in fully implementing our electronic health record, we shifted from first-come-first-serve intake to a more stream-lined triage approach, and we upgraded to an online volunteer portal rather than using a paper sign-up process.

All these highlights could not be possible without our team of competent and dedicated volunteers. We are undeniably grateful for how our volunteers, staff, board, and donors, have risen to meet the inevitable shifts and challenges that arise during period of growth.

Together, we have accomplished much more than we could have ever imagined toward the common good of our community. We celebrated our 20th anniversary, which is a testament to the Center's durability and lasting value. We received more grants this year than in past years. Most importantly, we have expanded our services so that we are able to serve more patients and clients than ever before. The center is far from out-living its ongoing potential to truly make a difference in the lives of vulnerable people in need of support.

The mission and vision of Center for Healing & Hope is stronger than ever. The Board, staff, and volunteers are committed to ensuring the Center

continues to play a transformative role in the lives of patients and clients by providing excellent medical care and immigration-related services and advocacy. There is much more good work to be done, and the Center for Healing & Hope continues to be in loving hands that are more than capable of moving its mission forward ... restoring health and renewing hope.

Ensuring adequate staffing of the clinics has become increasingly difficult as we adapt to higher numbers of patients. We are relying on fewer volunteers who are putting in more hours. Due to this, we have needed to turn away patients from the Urgent Care clinic due to lack of providers. We are seeking more qualified volunteers to help us meet our growing needs.
